

PRODUCT CERTIFICATIONS

When a manufactured good meets strict requirements, a small mark is placed on the product indicating that it has gone through extensive safety testing and is approved for public use. There are various product certification entities within the electrical industry, and their specific logos can be spotted on our power and data products.

Here's a quick breakdown of what each one means:

UL

UL stands for the Underwriter's Laboratories, Inc. (UL). This product certifying entity primarily works with electrical/mechanical equipment or materials tested and listed under their own product standards. When a UL symbol is incorporated onto electrical products, it identifies that specific product as meeting UL standards, requirements and certifications for public and commercial use.



ULc

ULc is the Canadian equivalent of the Underwriter's Laboratories, Inc. (UL). The ULc symbol is used on products listed for public and commercial use in Canada.



ETL

Intertek is another product certifying entity. This laboratory tests products according to UL standards and safety requirements for public and commercial use. An ETL mark appears on products tested by Intertek.
